

California Civil Code 1714.43 and the Modern Slavery Act 2015

The following disclosures are for compliance with California Civil Code 1714.43, known commonly as the California Transparency in Supply Chains Act of 2010 and the Modern Slavery Act 2015 which introduced changes in the UK relating to supply chain transparency.

Please Note: "Company" refers to Sensata Technologies, Inc. and its affiliates.

Sensata Technologies is a global company which does business with suppliers in many different countries around the world. As part of its standard terms and conditions of purchase from suppliers worldwide, the Company requires suppliers to comply with all applicable federal, state, municipal and local laws, orders and regulations, including but not limited to those affecting or limiting prices, production, purchase, sale and use of goods.

Furthermore, the Company requires suppliers to agree to timely certification of compliance with such laws in such forms as the Company may request.

The Company does not engage in verification of product supply chains to evaluate and address risks of human trafficking and slavery nor is such verification conducted by a third party.

The Company does not conduct audits of suppliers to evaluate supplier compliance with standards for human trafficking and slavery in supply chains. Verification is not done by an independent, unannounced audit.

The Company does not require direct suppliers to certify that materials incorporated into the product comply with laws regarding human trafficking and slavery of the country or countries in which they are doing business.

The Company does not maintain internal accountability standards and procedures for employees or contractors failing to meet Company standards regarding human trafficking and slavery.

The Company does not provide Company employees and management with direct responsibility for supply chain management training on human trafficking and slavery.
