Dear Sensata Supplier:

Although you may already be aware of this important issue, I want to alert you of important legislation that affects many of the industries that Sensata, and you, serve. Specifically, in July 2010, the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act became law. While this new law is primarily focused on financial regulatory reform, it also will require all public companies to report annually to the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) whether they use certain "Conflict Minerals" that are "necessary to the functionality or production" to their products that originate from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) or an adjoining country. The "Conflict Minerals" include columbite-tantalite (tantalum), cassiterite (tin), wolframite (tungsten) and gold.


All public companies providing financial reports to the SEC will need to conduct due diligence of their supply chains and an audit by an independent third party of their company's report is also likely. Your cooperation in this process is therefore critical to allow SEC-reporting companies, such as Sensata, to determine whether their products contain Conflict Minerals from the DRC or an adjoining country. In fact, Sensata has itself already received communications from customers seeking information regarding the dissemination of these requirements through the entire supply chain. One prominent example is an awareness letter from various OEMs as part of the Automotive Industry Action Group's (AIAG) conflict minerals working group. Whether you are an SEC-reporting company or not, this new law will require your assistance in complying with these requirements. Although final rules from the SEC to implement the Conflict Minerals reporting requirements are not expected until later this month, at the earliest, we will continue to monitor developments and provide additional information when available. Nevertheless, there are certain measures that Sensata requests you begin to undertake now. As referenced by the AIAG in its letter, such measures include determining which of your products contain the subject Conflict Minerals, mapping and identifying the raw material in your supply chain with respect to those products, and beginning the process of engaging with your suppliers to identify the smelters used in your supply chain to process the Conflict Minerals.

Sensata has created a supplier-based portal for you to provide preliminary information relative to our products and this Conflict Materials disclosure. Through this portal, we are requiring all suppliers to provide their preliminary information regarding their due diligence on the use and implications of the Conflict Minerals requirements through a limited questionnaire. As the SEC requirements become more detailed regarding such disclosures, Sensata will update our need for more information from our supply base through similar notifications through this portal. Sensata requests that you complete this initial disclosure questionnaire (see page 3) by September 30, 2011 to allow us to assess any areas where additional action plans may be required.
